Part II Teaching Programme

1. Objectives and Career Options

The objective of the Research Master Programme in Philosophy is to provide the knowledge and skills needed for philosophical research, either in preparation to a PhD programme or as the substantial basis for any type of career that requires first hand familiarity with philosophical problems (journalism, librarianship, editorial work, research management, etc). The programme is general, in so far as it seeks to broaden the students' understanding of philosophy, as well as specialized, in so far as it allows the student to deepen his/her understanding of a particular area: history of philosophy (ancient as well as modern), theoretical philosophy (logic, philosophy of science and epistemology) or practical philosophy (pure and applied ethics, political philosophy and philosophical anthropology). The programme finally aims at improving the student's ability to express him/herself in English, to write a research proposal and to participate, vocally and in writing, in philosophical discussions and debates. The programme consists of 120 ECTS (European Credit Transfer System) and can be completed in two years.

2. Philosophical Research at Utrecht University

The graduate programmes (Research Master and PhD) are closely associated with the Department's Research Institute ZENO. This hosts three different programmes.

2.1 History of Philosophy

Reception and Edition of Philosophical Texts

This programme is based on the idea that to understand a philosophical text it should be situated in its historical, religious and scientific context and that account should be taken of its reception. This approach gives the programme a rare methodological and scholarly coherence, despite the fact that its scope spans more than two millennia.

Ancient Philosophy

This part of the programme is led by Prof. Dr. Keimpe Algra. Other senior scholars are Dr Teun Tieleman and Prof. Dr. Jan van Ophuijsen (Cornelia J. de Vogel Chair). Prof. emeritus: Dr Jaap Mansfeld.

The distinctive aim of the subprogramme is to put fundamental research in relevant areas of ancient philosophy on a new, or at least revised, interpretive footing by offering a better insight in the nature of our sources, the *Sitz im Leben* of ancient philosophical practice, and the nature and limitations of the conceptual apparatus of ancient philosophy.

The study of doxography and source criticism are now primarily applied in the service of three distinct, though interrelated projects:

- (a) An 'edition of the fragments of the early Stoics' (Algra, Mansfeld, Tieleman, Van Ophuijsen).
- (b) 'Stoicism in Context' (Algra, Van Ophuijsen; funded by NWO), which focuses on the relation between Stoicism and its contemporary intellectual and philosophical context;
- (c) 'Habent sua fata libelli' (Tieleman, with dr. A. Merz from the Department of Theology; funded by Utrecht University 'High Potential' programme), which deals with the way in which 'normative' and 'formative' texts figured in philosophical schools and in early Christian Churches.

Modern Philosophy

This part of the programme is led by Prof. dr. Theo Verbeek. Other senior scholars are Dr. Erik-Jan Bos and Prof. dr. Piet Steenbakkers

It concentrates on the connection between philosophy, religion (theology) and science in the early modern period. The philological expertise built up under Prof. Karl Schuhmann (†2003) is now put into service for a new interpretive effort, which concentrates on Descartes (Cartesianism), Spinoza and the early Enlightenment. Specific projects are:

- 1. A critical edition of the Correspondence of Descartes (Prof. Theo Verbeek, dr Erik-Jan Bos, in co-operation with the Huygens Institute, The Hague). Work on this edition has acquired a new dimension by the NWO funded project 'Descartes and his network,' which focuses on the circulation of scientific and philosophical ideas in the early modern period. Together with Dr Erik-Jan Bos Prof. Verbeek also works on new editions/ translations of certain works of Descartes in the Bibliothèque de la Pléiade (Gallimard) and on a Dutch translation of Descartes' Passions de l'âme (1649).
- 2. A critical edition of the Works of Spinoza (Prof. Dr. Piet Steenbakkers together with a team of French and Italian scholars). A critical text of the *Ethics* is now established and will be published before long. Next are planned critical editions of Spinoza's *Correspondence* and *Renati des Cartes Principiorum philosophiae Pars I et II, more geometrico demonstratae* (1663). He is also working on Dutch translations of the Ethics and the Treatise on the Improvement of the Understanding.

2.2 Theoretical Philosophy

Logic, Meaning & Cognition

This programme is led by Prof.dr. Albert Visser. Other senior scholars are Prof.dr. Jan Bergstra, Dr. Vincent van Oostrom, Dr. Menno Lievers, Dr. Janneke van Lith.

The programme is divided into two smaller projects: a. *Proofs and Programmes b. Meaning and Knowing*

Proofs and Programmes aims at deepening our understanding of the notion of proof and the (closely related) notion of programme in both their static (theory and provability) and their dynamic aspects (computation and tranformation).

Meaning and Knowing is concerned with the study of relations between theories and with the nature of meaning (the static aspects of cognition) and with the development of theories to model the process of language interpretation.

There are several areas of overlap between these programmes. E.g. there is a shared interest in the issue of theory comparison —in *Proofs and Programmes* this is about formal theories; in *Meaning and Knowing* this concerns specific theories of physics. The study of interpretation in *Meaning and Knowing* uses ideas and insights from term rewriting, which is part of *Proofs and Programmes*.

2.3 Practical Philosophy

Normativity and Human Action

This programme is led by Prof. dr. Marcus Düwell. Other senior scholars are Dr. Bert van den Brink, Dr. Joel Anderson, Dr. Jan Vorstenbosch, Dr. Rob van Gerwen. The research for this programme is conducted in close collaboration with the *Ethiek Instituut* (scientific director Prof. Marcus Düwell).

This programme aims at examining philosophical concepts of normativity in their relation to specific practical questions and to their social, political and anthropological conditions. It consists of two smaller programmes:

Normativity in Moral Philosophy and Applied Ethics (Düwell, Vorstenbosch) concentrates on the relation between fundamental and applied ethics, focusing on the presuppositions that nourish ethical debates, as well as the importance of fundamental ethics for various bioethical discussions. There is also much attention for methodological and theoretical issues in relation to applied ethics, ethics of care, animal ethics, business ethics, etc.

Normativity and the Socio-Political Conditions for Human Agency focuses on social and psychological conditions of human agency, especially with respect to questions of personal autonomy and citizenship. A distinctive – and integrating – feature of this programme is the focus on individual autonomy, mutual recognition and the development of capacities.

3. Teaching Programme

The Programme consists of two parts:

- a general part (the 'core' programme), which must be followed by all students;
- a specific part in which the student specialises in a specific area of philosophy: history of philosophy, theoretical philosophy, or practical philosophy.

The 'core' programme consists of

- Classical Readings in Philosophy (three tutorials each 7.5 ECTS);
- Research seminar (7.5 ECTS).

The specialised part is fixed in consultation with the Programme Director and an Academic Tutor, chosen from the Academic Staff. Noramlly it will consist of:

- 4 courses taken from the Academic Master programme (30 ECTS), possibly enriched with some additional material;
- a selection of specialised courses and seminars taken from the programme of one of the National Research Schools with which the Department is affiliated as well as Tutorials, arranged in consultation with the Programme Director and the Tutor (together 30 ECTS).
- Master Thesis (30 ECTS).

Note: The general part does not have to be completed before the student embarks on his/her specialization.

3.1. The 'Core' Programme

Classical Readings (22.5 ECTS).

This part of the programme comprises three turorials. The aim is to familiarize the student, not only with some fundamental texts in the history of philosophy but also with the specific approach favoured in the area of his/her specialization. Each tutorial will be completed with a paper of 2.500 words. Assessment will be based, not only on the final paper but also on the student's performance during the tutorial.

- 1. Classical texts in physics and scientific method (Algra, Verbeek): Aristotle, *Analytica posteriora* and *Physics* (abstracts); Descartes, *Regulae ad directionem ingenii* and a selection of texts on natural philosophy (*Le monde*; *Principia* I-II)
- 2. Classical texts on modal and intentional logic (Visser): A selection of texts from Quine, Kripke, Gödel, Loeb and Leibniz.
- 3. Classical texts on Morality and Law (Düwell): Kant, *Kritik der praktischen Vernunft*; Hegel, *Rechtsphilosophie* (selections).

In 2006-7 it is the turn of Aristotle and Descartes (1). The course will start in the second term and have the form of a tutorial.

General seminar (7.5 ECTS).

The Research seminar consists of monthly presentations of philosophical research (by Master and PhD students), guest lectures in philosophy and history of philosophy and training sessions in philosophical writing. Master students are required to attend all meetings during their two years of study.

3.2 Specialization

The Department has three areas of specialization, corresponding to the three areas in which it hosts specialized research: history of philosophy (ancient and early modern), theoretical philosophy (logic, theory of science, etc) and practical philosophy (pure and applied ethics). This model is internationally accepted and is now also followed by most other Dutch Philosophy Departments. This part of the programme can be subdivided into:

- 'Optionals' (30 ECTS), to be taken from the ordinary Master Programme;
- 'Seminars' (30 ECTS) which are accessible only for students, on Research Master or Ph.D. level, who specialize in a specific sub-area of philosophy (history of philosophy, theoretical philosophy or practical philosophy).

Optionals (30 ECTS)

The student will follow four master courses and -seminars in his/her own discipline. These will be taken from the 'ordinary' (one-year) Master programme. For an overview see p. 21.

Tutorials and seminars (30 ECTS)

The emphasis in this part of the programme is on personal coaching and training. In practice the leaders of the various research groups will supervise the students. The focus here is definitely on the sub-area of philosophy in which the student is to submit a Master Thesis and, ideally, a Ph.D. dissertation. The general aim is to test the student's scholarly qualities and to provide him/her with a deepened insight in the problems and literature of his/her discipline.

The basis is formed by two research seminars, each of one year, in which students of both years as well as Ph.D. students participate (together 15 ECTS), and which are given by the research programme leaders in each sub-area). In each sub-area one research seminar of 7.5 ECTS will be offered each year. This seminar will be geared to the current research projects carried out by the staff in the respective sub-area. The seminar spreads over the whole year and consists of usually ten meetings of three hours each. Students will be required to submit a paper and give a presentation. Performance during the whole colloquium will be part of the final assessment.

In addition the student has to follow extra specialized seminars or tutorials (15 ECTS) which are to be selected from what is offered by the Department itself and by the various research schools and centres in which the Department participates (summer schools, etc): OIKOS, Leiden-Utrecht-Leuven Centre for Ancient Philosophy, Huizinga Instituut, NOSTER, Ethiek Instituut, Research school Ethics, Research school Logic (OZSL).

(a) History of Philosophy:

- For students in ancient philosophy the joint Centre for Ancient Philosophy of the Universities of Utrecht, Leiden and Leuven which over the past years has successfully organized seminars for research staff and graduate students (see below) will offer a programme of three special courses a year for students in the Research Master. Each of these institutions will contribute one course each year (of 7.5. ECTS each). These courses are linked to the main research topics of the three universities (Hellenistic philosophy in Utrecht, ancient Aristotelian tradition in Leiden, Neoplatonism in Leuven).
- Each year the Centre organizes a weekend devoted to close reading of a selected text (recent examples: Plato's Seventh Letter (2001), Aristotle Metphysics a (2002), Porphyry, De Abstinentia I (2003); in addition there is a yearly (one-day) thematic conference (recent examples: on evil in Neoplatonic metaphysics (2000), on the early Stoic fragments (2001), on philosophy of language (2002)).
- In addition students will participate in the existing graduate programme organized by OIKOS (the Dutch research school for Classical Studies). This programme includes seminars on the history and methodology of classical studies, multidisciplinary reading seminars ('Text in context'), and the presentation of work in progress of *promovendi* (PhD students).
- Students in modern philosophy will follow a programme shared with Nijmegen, Leuven and Rotterdam, which is now under construction. Students in modern philosophy are encouraged to take additional courses in ancient and medieval philosophy.

(b) Practical Philosophy:

 Each year the Ethiek instituut offers two additional courses in applied ethics. The same institute is running a programme in cooperation with institutes from different European countries. Students can also follow courses of the national research school for practical philosophy which include courses in ethical theory, political philosophy and philosophical anthropology.

(c) In the area of Theoretical Philosophy:

- The research school in logic OZSL has a long record of excellent Master Classes taught by internationally acclaimed experts. These courses are on topics in pure logic, logic and linguistics, logic and computer science and logic and philosophy. Students in theoretical philosophy can follow the courses of the yearly OZSL 'schoolweek.'
- Students can also follow courses in the master of logic in Amsterdam in which the research group on Theoretical Philosophy participates.
- Specialized courses and seminars will be offered by the Utrecht Department of Mathematics (Profs. Ieke Moerdijk and Jaap van Oosten).

Part of the programme may be completed abroad, again in consultation with the tutor and the programme director. Students should contact their tutor early if this is anticipated

MA Thesis

The MA thesis is a substantial and original piece of work written in English, which takes account of the existing literature on the subject. Students are encouraged to settle early on a subject, in consultation with their intended supervisor, who alone is held responsible for the definitive choice. Especially those who want to pursue a PhD career would be well advised to choose a subject in one of the research projects of the department. Some recent examples of successful theses:

- The Ethics of Plotinus
- The Contingent Law: A Tale of Maxwell's Demon
- Cosmopolitan Citizenship, Democracy and Inclusion in an International Context
- Favours, Fellowship and Friendship in Seneca
- Quasi-Realism and the Frege-Geach Problem
- Critical Paradoxes: Nietzsche, Adorno, Foucault and the Problem of Radical Criticism of Culture
- Predicate Provability Logic
- The Dynamics of Thought: Spinoza on True Ideas in the Tractatus Intellectus
- Constructive Empiricism

The final text should consist of 16.000 to 32.000 (between 40 and 80 pages). It must display a clear and intelligible structure and should in any case contain: an introduction, in which the question is situated with respect to the literature on the subject ('status quaestionis'), a discussion of alternative solutions and/or interpretations and a conclusion, which illuminates the relevance of the result and the pertinence of the method that has been used to reach that result. Finally, there should be a bibliography compiled in accordance with the rules and criteria adopted in the area of research.

A set of detailed rules and criteria (for students and staff) will be available at the information desk.

4. Examinations

4.1 Examination requirements

The examination requirements for the programme are set out in the Education and Examination Regulations, which are available at http://www.phil.uu.nl/en/education/students/

If the student has completed his/her programme and if a final version of his Thesis has been approved by the superviser and the supervising committee, the student can apply for the final examination, which takes the form of a public discussion of his/her Thesis. The application is can be filed only after the course results are checked and certified by the Students Adviser and the Board of Examiners. It must be submitted at least three weeks before the final examination takes place. Examinations are held every last Friday of each month, except July.

4.2 Exemptions

Students wishing exemptions should submit a motivated request (in writing) to the Board of Examiners (Dr Teun Tieleman).
